

The original and each copy of an application for a passport must have attached to it a copy of the applicant's photograph. A loose signed photograph of the applicant must accompany the application. The photographs must be on this paper, should have a light background, and be not over three inches in size.

This blank must be completely filled out. The legal fee of one dollar, in currency or postal money order, and the applicant's certificate of naturalization must accompany the application. The rules should be carefully read before mailing the application to the Department of State, Division of Passport Control, Washington, D. C.

I solemnly swear that I was born at Stadeleben, then in the Kingdom of Hannover on January 18th, 1864, that my father, F. L. Eichenberg, was

born in same place and country and is now residing at dead;

that I emigrated to the United States, sailing from Hamburg, G. about Sept. 4th, 1887; that I resided abt. 32 years, temporary foreign visits excluded, uninterruptedly, in the United States,

from 1894 to 1919 in Texas, of which abt. 23 years at Galveston; that I was

naturalized as a citizen of the United States before the County Court of Galveston County at Galveston, Texas

on Jan. 23rd, 1903, as shown by the Certificate of Naturalization presented herewith; that I am the IDENTICAL PERSON described in said Certificate; that I have resided outside the United States since my naturalization at the following places for the following periods:

and that I am domiciled in the United States, my permanent residence being at Galveston in the State of Texas, where I follow the occupation of exporter

My last passport was obtained from Washington, D. C. in July 1916 and was cancelled on return I am about

to go abroad temporarily, and intend to return to the United States within six months with the purpose of residing and performing the duties of citizenship therein; and I desire a passport for use in visiting the countries hereinafter named for the following purpose:

I intend to leave the United States from the port of New York, N. Y. or Hoboken, N. J. sailing on board the S. S. Oscar II on June 19th, 1919
