After the lifting of restrictions on civilian traffic (Verkehrssperre) around 10<sup>th</sup> July 1942, the "big" transports of Jews out of the German Reich to Theresienstadt resumed. These train numbers presumably fell in the group "Da 70" onwards.

A total of 2490 persons were deported in 11 transports and 6 transports of individuals (Einzeltransport) out of Hamburg to the Bohemian ghetto. Among these, 1487 were over the age of 65 and 542 survived the war. The "big" transport of 15<sup>th</sup> July 1942 included at least 10 persons from Oldenburg, 5 from Friedrichstadt, 8 from Wilhelmshaven, 2 from Cuxhaven, 3 from Aurich, 2 from Wesermunde, 2 from Kiel and 2 from the town of Norden. Presumably almost 200 people from the environs of Hamburg were included in the transport, which could explain the differing data on numbers. The transport was assigned the designation "VI/1" in Theresienstadt. From this transport by September and October 1942, 278 persons had been transferred to Treblinka and, at the beginning of 1943 and in the course of 1944, a further 124 Jews to Auschwitz. Only 40 persons from this transport lived to see the 8<sup>th</sup> of May 1945.
