From the area controlled by the State Police HQ in Hanover, a total of 1039 persons were deported in 7 transports, of which two should be regarded as individual transports, to the Bohemian ghetto for the aged. Of these, 318 survived to be liberated. The special train of 23<sup>rd</sup> July 1942 was the only large transport to Theresienstadt out of Hanover, and had the State Railways number "Da 75". At least 114 persons from Bremen were attached to this train. The catchment area for this transport, which in Theresienstadt received the designation "VIII/1" was quite wide. The Jews summoned for deportation also originated in Brandenburg, Bremervörde, Diepholz, Emden, Göttingen, Hannoversch Münden, Hildesheim, Langenhagen, Lemförde, Münden am Deister, Nordenham, Peine, Rinteln, Sachsenhagen, Springe, Vegesack, Weener und Wolfenbüttel, with a few people from Blankenburg and Osterode in the Harz, and from Halberstadt. As far as is known, 135 of them reached Treblinka in September and October 1942 in various transports. Early in 1943, another 23 persons went to Auschwitz, with another 96 following them during 1944. Out of the whole transport from Hanover 75 saw the end of the war.
